How would you identify a true Scottish wildcat?

Say one of the numbers written on this game board in Gaelic.
Try to choose a different number each time someone lands on this square.

an toiseach

How quickly can you complete all the Scottish wildcat challenges?

The game can be played as a group.

At the start, place the counter on disc 1 - a h-aon. Place the playing piece on the 'an toiseach' square.

Roll the dice and move the playing piece the number of spaces required. Follow instructions or answer the questions.

Each time the group completes a wildcat challenge , the counter can move up one.

The aim is to complete all the challenges so that the counter reaches disc 6 - a sia.

If the playing piece lands on a challenge already completed, continue play.

If the playing piece lands on a question already completed, either repeat answers to reinforce or continue play.

The 'naming' squares are designed to be landed on a number of times and players are encouraged to think of a different answer each time.

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
